Surely the mission of the BBC should be the raising of national standards in every sphere of it's production. 

They are 'settlers' who wish to retain their own culture (and aggressive) identity. In such critical matters for our nation the BBC remains reprehensively silent from a mixture of 'political correctness', misplaced 'liberal' prejudice and fear.

I will conclude by saying that these observations are not 'racist' or from a member of the far, far right. They are from an ordinary English native dismayed at the decline of our society: A decline massively reflected and promoted by the BBC in recent years.
