Pre-Budget Report 2009 for the South West

The Government's objective is to build a strong economy and a fair society, where there is opportunity and security for all. Therefore, today, the Chancellor announces a package of measures that will continue to support businesses, families and the environment. These measures include:

Supporting business

Enterprise Finance Guarantee Scheme (Small Business Scheme) to support up to £1.3bn of banks lending to smaller SME's was due to close in March 2010. This has now been extended for another 6 months. So far in the South West, over £73m of eligible applications from 792 firms that have been granted or are being processed and assessed.

Extension of the temporary increase in the threshold for empty property relief (EPR) for a further year. For 2010/11, the threshold at which an empty property becomes liable for business rates will be £18,000. Relief applicable to owners of empty properties with rateable values up to £18,000, estimated to exempt 77% of empty properties in the South West region.

In order to strengthen the incentives to invest in innovative industries and ensure the UK remains an attractive location for innovation, Government announces it will introduce a Patent Box, applying a reduced rate of Corporation Tax to income from patents from April 2013.

Families

Bringing the Young Person's Guarantee forward to 6 months will provide, from April, guaranteed access to a job, work experience or training to all 18-24s who have been claiming JSA for 6 months, with mandatory access from 10 months. In October, there were 4,855 young people aged 18-24 who had claimed JSA for over 6 months in the South West.

A full basic State Pension (bSP) will increase by £2.40 to £97.65 per week (full couples rate rises by £3.85 to £156.15). This is in line with the Government's commitment to uprate bSP by at least 2.5%, even though the retail price index is negative. This will benefit an estimated 1.1 million people in the South West.

To support low-income families, and improve incentives to work, the Government will extend eligibility to Free School Meals to primary school pupils in working families with a household income below £16,190. From September 2011, the Government's aim is that all primary school pupils in low-income working families will be entitled to receive Free School Meals, benefiting around 500,000 children. In addition, the Government will extend the current pilots of universal Free School Meals, so that there is a pilot in each English region.

Public services

To protect frontline services PBR announces a package to ensure that;

- 1) NHS near-cash frontline spending - the 95 per cent or so of spending that supports patient care - will rise in line with inflation in 2010-11 and 2012-13;
- 2) in 2011-12 and 2012-13 spending on frontline schools rises in real terms by 0.7 per cent a year and spending on 16 to 19 participation rises in real terms by 0.9 per cent a year. Spending on Sure Start Children's Centres will be maintained in line with inflation; and
- 3) sufficient funding will be provided to police authorities to allow them to maintain the number of police officers and community support officers.

Bournemouth, Dorset, and Poole have chosen to focus on services and support for older people for their Total Place work, including a shift in investment to preventative action and measures to deliver improved services and outcomes at less cost. Today's PBR extends the Government's willingness to work with local authorities and agencies to reduce burdens and ringfences signalled in Smarter Government by considering the means of supporting local investment in sustainable growth.

Tackling climate change

Additional funding for the Warm Front scheme in England, and funding reprioritised within the scheme will be used to provide heating and insulation for low-income households. 6,500 homes in the South West could benefit from this additional funding.

Jim Knight, Regional Minister for the South West, said:

"I welcome the Pre Budget Report, which builds on government measures to provide support for individuals and businesses as announced in the Budget. The Pre Budget Report balances the need to continue to invest in the short-term for recovery and the need to ensure that public finances are on a sustainable footing in the medium term."

Liam Byrne, Chief Secretary to the Treasury, said:

"This Pre-Budget Report will help lock in Britain's recovery, protecting families and businesses in the South West through the downturn and also accelerate growth."

By taking tough action on tax and spending, we'll halve the deficit in four years, and along with future growth will help us to protect and drive up standards in schools, hospitals and local policing right across the South West."
