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Introduction

1. The Agriculture and Environment Biotechnology Commission (AEBC) was launched by the Government in June 2000 with a remit to provide independent strategic advice on developments in biotechnology and their implications for agriculture and the environment.
2. This report covers the period October 2002 to November 2003. It sets out how we have approached our work, and our key achievements over the year.
3. Our origin was a review in 1999 by the Cabinet Office and the Office of Science and Technology of the Advisory and Regulatory Framework for Biotechnology. This review concluded that a broader approach was needed for strategic issues, and the AEBC forms part of the new strategic framework.
4. The AEBC was set up to be an experimental and innovative advisory body, and the Government appointed our twenty members from a diverse range of backgrounds, with a wide range of skills and expertise. We are charged with working in an open and transparent way, to look at the broad picture, and to take ethical and social issues into account as well as the science. In the highly sensitive and complex area of biotechnology, we aim to assist the process of constructive public debate involving all interests and encourage respect for the spectrum of views.
5. We develop our advice to Ministers by gathering and analysing evidence and debating the issues thoroughly and robustly. We report jointly to Margaret Beckett, the Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs, and to Patricia Hewitt, the Secretary of State for Trade and Industry. We also report to the following Ministers in the devolved administrations: Ross Finnie, Scottish Executive Minister for Environment and Rural Development, Carwyn Jones, Welsh Assembly Minister for Rural Development and Wales Abroad and Angela Smith, Minister of the Environment, Northern Ireland.

SUMMARY

5. Our third year has seen the Government respond positively to our report, *Animals and Biotechnology*. The Government's full response is available on our website (www.aebc.gov.uk). The Government also accepted our advice for a public debate to take place about the possible commercialisation of GM Crops. The Chair and several other members of the AEBC were members of the debate steering board which published its report, *GM Nation? The Findings of the Public Debate*, in September 2003. Our third major report, *GM Crops? Coexistence and Liability* was published on 25 November 2003. The report looks at the key issues of coexistence and liability were GM crops to be grown commercially in the UK.

How we have gone about our work

6. The AEBC is committed to working openly and transparently. We have held full Commission meetings in a number of locations around the United Kingdom (see Annex B). We use our website (www.aebc.gov.uk) and a mixture of approaches to promote our meetings locally and nationally. The minutes of Commission meetings are posted on our website. We publish our draft

reports, as well as the final versions, on our website. We have a long list of stakeholders with whom we keep in touch.

7. All of our meetings this year have been held in public. We continue to explore a variety of innovative approaches to help us fulfil our remit to engage the public. These principles were also employed in the public debate on GM, which allowed the public to frame the issues for debate and focused on getting people whose voice had not been heard to participate in the programme.
8. We have open dialogues with a wide range of interested groups and organisations. The Commission tries to be innovative in selecting the audiences it targets and the way it chooses to engage with them.
9. We always welcome suggestions or comments about our work and priorities, and about the best ways to approach our work. We actively encourage feedback from everyone who attends our open meetings.

What we have done this year

PUBLISHED OUR THIRD MAJOR REPORT

10. Our third major report, *GM Crops? Coexistence and Liability* was published on 25 November 2003.
11. The report looks at whether it would be practical for the commercial production of GM crops to coexist with existing conventional and organic systems of agricultural production in a way that secures continuing real choice to consumers, as well as the issue of what would happen if the commercial production of GM crops turned out to have a damaging effect on the environment.
12. This was a challenging report to produce. Coexistence and liability are complex and contentious issues, and the Commission members hold a wide range of perspectives. Furthermore, the report was produced against a background of changing political and legislative circumstances, both at national and EU level.
13. Much of the initial work was undertaken by two working groups of the Commission, looking at Consumer Choice and Environmental liability respectively. But the final report, *GM Crops? Coexistence and Liability* is a report of the full Commission. All members agreed its content, including the nine recommendations to Government in which the Commission was unanimous. The report can be viewed on our website (www.aebc.gov.uk, under "Reports").
14. The working groups tested their emerging conclusions with stakeholders as they went along. Two well-attended stakeholder seminars were held in April 2003. Reports of these meetings can also be found on our website.

GM PUBLIC DEBATE STEERING BOARD PUBLISHED ITS REPORT

15. *GM Nation? The Public Debate* was held as a result of a recommendation in the AEBC's report *Crops on Trial* (September 2001).
16. In its response to this recommendation, Government asked the AEBC to provide advice on: how and when to promote an effective public debate on the possible commercial growing of the FSE crops, who should be involved, and how to make best use of the results of such a debate.
17. The Secretary of State for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs invited Professor Malcolm Grant, Chairman of the AEBC, to lead the debate and to appoint an independent steering board. He appointed a board of 11 members, 7 of whom were, at the time of their appointment, members of the AEBC.

19. The debate took place alongside an assessment of the overall costs and benefits of GM crops by the Prime Minister's Strategy Unit (PMSU) and an independent review of the science of GM. Several members of the AEBC helped PMSU in their work and Julie Hill and Phil Dale were appointed as members of the GM Science Review Panel.
20. *GM Nation? The Public Debate* was an unprecedented, unique and innovative nationwide event. The issues for discussion were framed by members of the public, through a series of workshops held over a fortnight in November 2002. Briefing materials were prepared, and distributed in paper copy, and by CD-Rom and a website. A video was also made.
21. The debate was formally launched on 3 June 2003 with a press briefing in London, and 6 major regional events. These were followed by public meetings across the country. COI communications, who were appointed by the Steering Board to manage the debate programme day-by-day, estimated that between 16 June and 18 July there were over 600 regional, county and local meetings. In total 36,557 feedback forms were completed.

22. The GM Public Debate Steering Board published a full and unanimous report of the outcomes of the debate, *GM Nation? The Findings of the Public Debate*, on 24 September 2003. The report can be viewed from our website. It received widespread media coverage and was welcomed by Government. Ministers are committed to respond formally to its findings.

What the Commission's working groups have been doing

23. The Commission has taken much of its work forward in working groups. The groups undertake initial framing of the issues in consultation with stakeholders and with the Commission as a whole, and prepare drafts for debate by the full Commission.
24. The working groups over the past year have been considering:
- Liability
 - Consumer Choice and Coexistence

LIABILITY

25. This group continued its work on liability in agriculture and the environment relating to GMOs. It considered whether the existing liability regime was sufficient, whether it needed a revision, and whether there were other better ways of addressing potential issues raised.
26. The group produced a liability scenario consultation paper on 30 September 2002 and received responses from farming bodies, farmers, private citizens, NGOs, agricultural institutes and industry bodies.
27. The group held an evidence taking session in November 2002 which included evidence from lawyers, a social research discussion and a discussion on farming perspectives.
28. The group held a stakeholder seminar in April 2003 to test and develop its tentative conclusions and to consider unanswered questions. The seminar and subsequent discussions with stakeholders provided invaluable evidence and influenced the working group's thinking.

CONSUMER CHOICE AND COEXISTENCE

29. This group continued its work on consumer choice issues from two angles: what consumers want now and may want in the future; and how this could be delivered in practical terms by producers.
30. The group considered what factors affect consumers' purchasing decisions, the regulatory provisions that will impact on consumer choice and, were GM crops to be commercialised, how they might coexist with other forms of agriculture.
31. The group held a stakeholder seminar in April 2003 to discuss the practicability of coexistence measures with key stakeholders. The seminar and subsequent discussions with stakeholders provided invaluable evidence and influenced the group's thinking.
32. The two working groups were merged in April 2003, and their findings were incorporated into the report on Coexistence and Liability, published in November 2003.

33. In addition, the AEBC was represented on the research review group for a baseline study commissioned by Defra on impacts of crop and livestock production systems. The study, *A Review of Research into the Environmental and Socio-Economic Impacts of Contemporary and Alternative Arable Cropping Systems*, was published in May 2003.
34. Details of the groups' membership and terms of reference are at Annex D.

Working with other bodies

35. Our Chair and Deputy Chair, Professor Malcolm Grant and Julie Hill, have had a range of formal and informal contacts with other regulatory and advisory bodies in the area. The Chair has had meetings with Ministers from Defra and from the Devolved Administrations, and Professor Sir David King, the Government's Chief Scientific Adviser. Sir Brian Bender (Permanent Secretary, Defra) spoke at a Commission pre-meeting dinner in September.
36. Professor Malcolm Grant spoke at a range of events following *GM Nation? The Public Debate*, including Hampshire County Council's GM Debate Conference; a Foundation for Science and Technology discussion meeting; Swiss Re, International Biotechnology Forum, Zurich; Society and Biosciences Seminar, University College London; Innogen Conference, Edinburgh; and the Steele Raymond Annual Lecture, Bournemouth.
37. Professor Malcolm Grant gave evidence to the House of Commons Select Committee on Environment, Food and Rural Affairs in October 2003 as part of their enquiry on *GM Nation? The Public Debate*. The Committee's report, *Conduct of the GM Public Debate* [HC1220], was published on 20 November 2003.

Membership

38. The initial three-year period of appointment of members of the Commission expired at the end of January 2003. The Commission lost no members during that period. Two members, Professors Banner and Mepham, decided not to seek re-appointment, and Dr Turner stood down at the end of July 2003. The remaining members were reappointed by Ministers, some for a further two years and some for three years.
39. Dr Paul Rylott and Dr David Buckeridge were appointed to the Commission from April 2003, and Professor Keekok Lee from October 2003 (See Annex A).

Media relations

40. The AEBC's media relations are handled from within the secretariat

Fees and resources

41. Commission members are not salaried but do receive fees for days they spend on AEBC work. These fees are £150 per day for members and £188 for the Chair and Deputy Chair. Members can also obtain reimbursement for their travel, subsistence and other direct costs of AEBC work.
42. The Commission has a secretariat of five full-time equivalent staff plus a part-time communications advisor provided by Government and based in the Office of Science and Technology, part of the Department of Trade and Industry.
43. Throughout the period covered by this report the Secretary to the Commission was Richard Abel, who also served as the Secretary to the independent Steering Board for the Public Debate on GM. He left the Commission in November 2003, after two years in post, to take up a new appointment. Commission members wish to express their gratitude to him for the exceptional contribution he made to their work, and to welcome his successor (formerly his deputy), Dr Paul van Heyningen.
44. The running costs of the Commission are met by Government. A number of departments, including departments in the devolved administrations, contribute to the funding. The costs of running the AEBC, including the Commission meetings, publications, external consultancy, research, members' fees and expenses, press office and publicity were £251,000 for 2002/03.

Annex C

Terms of reference

In 1999 the Government reviewed its advisory and regulatory framework on biotechnology. It concluded that a broader approach was needed for strategic issues. The Agriculture and Environment Biotechnology Commission (AEBC) forms part of the new strategic framework.

The Commission will:

- offer strategic advice to Government on biotechnology issues which impact on agriculture and the environment;
- liaise closely with, but not duplicate, the work of the other two bodies which together with the AEBC form the new strategic advisory framework i.e.:
 - *the Human Genetics Commission (HGC)* which will advise on genetic technologies and their impact on humans; and
 - *the Food Standards Agency (FSA)* which will include within its responsibilities all aspects of the safety and use of genetically modified food and animal feed.
- keep under review current and possible future developments in biotechnology with actual or potential implications for agriculture and the environment;
- advise Government on the ethical and social implications arising from these developments and their public acceptability; and
- consider and advise on any specific issues relating to relevant aspects of biotechnology as requested by the Government.

As part of this process the Commission is expected to:

- identify any gaps in the regulatory and advisory framework;
- consider the wider implications of the lessons to be learned from individual cases requiring regulatory decision;
- advise on any changes which should be made to Government guidelines which regulatory bodies are required to follow;
- make recommendations as to changes in the current structure of regulatory and advisory bodies;
- co-ordinate and exchange information with the relevant regulatory and advisory bodies;
- seek to involve and consult stakeholders and the public on a regular basis on the issues which it is considering; and
- operate in accordance with best practice for public bodies with regard to openness, transparency, accessibility, timeliness and exchange of information.

The Commission will:

- in carrying out its work take into account European and global developments;
- nationally, adopt a UK perspective taking appropriate account of legal and other differences between England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland; and
- draw up a work programme.

The Government may also ask the Commission for advice on a particular issue and, if necessary, direct it not to become involved in an area if this could be better handled elsewhere.

- * In the context of the work of the Commission 'Government' comprises the UK Government and the devolved administrations.

Annex E

Code of conduct

PUBLIC SERVICE VALUES

The board of this advisory non-departmental public body must at all times:

- observe the highest standards of **impartiality, integrity and objectivity** in relation to the advice they provide and the management of this public body;
- be **accountable** to Parliament and the public more generally for its activities and for the standard of advice it provides; and
- in accordance with Government policy on **openness, comply** fully with the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information.

The minister of the sponsoring department is answerable to Parliament for the policies and performance of this body, including the policy framework within which it operates.

STANDARDS IN PUBLIC LIFE

All board members must

- follow the Seven Principles of Public Life set out by the Committee on Standards in Public Life (attached to the end of this Code);
- comply with this Code, and ensure they understand their duties, rights and responsibilities, and that they are familiar with the function and role of this body and any relevant statements of Government policy. New board members should consider attending relevant training or induction courses;
- not misuse information gained in the course of their public service for personal gain or for political purpose, nor seek to use the opportunity of public service to promote their private interests or those of connected persons, firms, businesses or other organisations; and
- not hold any paid or high-profile unpaid posts in a political party, and not engage in specific political activities on matters directly affecting the work of this body. When engaging in other political activities, board members should be conscious of their public role and exercise proper discretion. These restrictions do not apply to MPs (in those cases where MPs are eligible to be appointed), to local councillors, or to Peers in relation to their conduct in the House of Lords.

Role of board members

Members of the board have collective responsibility for the operation of this body. They must:

- engage fully in collective consideration of the issues, taking account of the full range of relevant factors, including any guidance issued by the sponsor department or the responsible minister;
- ensure that the Code of Practice on Access to Government Information (including prompt responses to public requests for information) is adhered to; agree an Annual Report; and, where practicable and appropriate, hold at least one meeting a year in public;

- respond appropriately to complaints, if necessary with reference to the sponsor department; and
- ensure that the board does not exceed its powers or functions.

Communications between the board and the minister will generally be through the chair except where the board has agreed that an individual member should act on its behalf. Nevertheless, any board member has the right of access to ministers on any matter which he or she believes raises important issues relating to his or her duties as a board member. In such cases the agreement of the rest of the board should normally be sought.

Individual board members can normally be removed from office by the minister if they fail to perform the duties required of them in line with the standards expected in public office.

The role of the chair

The chair has particular responsibility for providing effective leadership on the issues above. In addition, the chair is responsible for:

- ensuring that the board meets at appropriate intervals, and that the minutes of meetings and any reports to the Secretary of State accurately record the decisions taken and, where appropriate, the views of individual board members;
- representing the views of the board to the general public; and
- ensuring that new board members are briefed on appointment (and their training needs considered), and providing an assessment of their performance, on request, when members are considered for re-appointment to the board or for appointment to the board of some other public body.

Handling conflicts of interests

The purpose of these provisions is to avoid any danger of board members being influenced, or appearing to be influenced, by their private interests in the exercise of their public duties. All board members should therefore declare any personal or business interest which may, or may be perceived (by a reasonable member of the public) to, influence their judgement. This should include, as a minimum, personal direct and indirect pecuniary interests, and should normally also include, such interests of close family members and of people living in the same household¹. The register of interests should be kept up-to-date and be open to the public. A declaration of any interest should also be made at any board meeting if it relates specifically to a particular issue under consideration, for recording in the minutes (whether or not a board member also withdraws from the meeting).

Board members should not participate in the discussion or determination of matters in which they have an interest, and should normally withdraw from the meeting (even if held in public) if:

- their interest is direct and pecuniary; or
- their interest is covered in specific guidance issued by this body or the sponsor department which requires them not to participate and/or to withdraw from the meeting.

¹ Indirect pecuniary interests arise from connections with bodies which have a direct pecuniary interest or from being a business partner of, or being employed by, a person with such an interest. Non-pecuniary interests include those arising from membership of clubs and other organisations. Close family members include personal partners, parents, children (adult and minor), brothers, sisters and the personal partners of any of these.

Personal liability of board members

Legal proceedings by a third party against individual board members of advisory bodies are very exceptional. A board member may be personally liable if he or she makes a fraudulent or negligent statement which results in a loss to a third party; or may commit a breach of confidence under common law or a criminal offence under insider dealing legislation, if he or she misuses information gained through their position. However, the Government has indicated that an individual board member who has acted honestly and in good faith will not have to meet out of his or her own personal resources any personal civil liability which is incurred in the execution or purported execution of his or her board function, save where the person has acted recklessly. Board members who need further advice should consult the sponsor department.

THE SEVEN PRINCIPLES OF PUBLIC LIFE

Selflessness

Holders of public office should take decisions solely in terms of the public interest. They should not do so in order to gain financial or other material benefits for themselves, their family, or their friends.

Integrity

Holders of public office should not place themselves under any financial or other obligation to outside individuals or organisations that might influence them in the performance of their official duties.

Objectivity

In carrying out public business, including making public appointments, awarding contracts, or recommending individuals for rewards and benefits, holders of public office should make choices on merit.

Accountability

Holders of public office are accountable for their decisions and actions to the public and must submit themselves to whatever scrutiny is appropriate to their office.

Openness

Holders of public office should be as open as possible about all the decisions and actions that they take. They should give reasons for their decisions and restrict information only when the wider public interest clearly demands.

Honesty

Holders of public office have a duty to declare any private interests relating to their public duties and to take steps to resolve any conflicts arising in a way that protects the public interests.

Leadership

Holders of public office should promote and support these principles by leadership and example.
