SPILOVER FACILITY FOR 4 AND 5 NOVEMBER

Members of the public who are unable to sit in the Public Gallery of the Guildhall due to the high level of attendance expected on 4 and 5 November for the evidence of Martin McGuinness may watch the Inquiry proceedings via CCTV at the Calgach Centre.

Document screens will also be available.

Seats cannot be reserved for this facility and they will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

A number of the seats available will be set aside for media unable to obtain the accreditation needed to access the Media Centre and Press Gallery at the Guildhall.

As with the public seating, these media seats cannot be reserved but will be allocated on a first come first served basis.

Please note:

- There will be no telephone, fax or broadcast facilities at the Calgach Centre.
- Cameras, film equipment or tape recorders are not allowed in the Calgach Centre under any circumstances.
- No filming, photography or sound recording of CCTV and document screens is permitted – *action will be taken against any individual or organisation that breaches this rule - this could include exclusion from the Inquiry or complete withdrawal of the facility.*

Notes to Editors

1. The Calgach Centre is located on Butcher Street (50m West from the Diamond) five minutes walk from the Guildhall. The spillover facility will be located on the first floor. There is a lift for those unable to use the stairs.
2. The Inquiry's previous spillover facility at the Rialto cinema is no longer available.
3. The Bloody Sunday Inquiry was announced in a statement by the Prime Minister on 29 January 1998 to "inquire into the events of Sunday 30 January 1972 which led to loss of life in connection with the procession in Londonderry on that day, taking account of any new information relevant to the events of that day".
4. The Inquiry's Chairman is Lord Saville of Newdigate; the other two members of the Tribunal are the Honourable William Hoyt and the Honourable John Toohey.
5. The Inquiry began its oral hearings on 27 March 2000 at the Guildhall, Londonderry.
