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## News Release

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### **PROPOSALS FOR PARLIAMENTARY CONSTITUENCY BOUNDARIES IN THE COUNTY OF NORTH YORKSHIRE AND THE CITY OF YORK**

**The Commission will publish provisional recommendations on 23 May 2002 for changes to seven of the eight constituencies in the area covered by the County of North Yorkshire and the City of York.**

#### **Provisional Recommendations**

1. Following the North Yorkshire (District of York) (Structural and Boundary Changes) Order 1995, the City of York was enlarged, acquired unitary authority status and ceased to form part of the county of North Yorkshire. The remaining seven districts in the county formed the County of North Yorkshire.
2. North Yorkshire has a 2000 electorate of 438,743 and a theoretical entitlement to 6.27 seats. The City of York has a 2000 electorate of 142,773 and a theoretical entitlement to 2.04 seats. The county averages of both areas are close to the electoral quota (69,934), at 73,124 and 71,387 respectively. The combined area of North Yorkshire and the City of York currently has eight constituencies. The Commission have therefore provisionally decided to review both areas separately and to allocate six seats to North Yorkshire and two seats to York. The electoral quota is explained in "Rules" below.
3. Since the last general review, there have been changes to the district ward boundaries as a result of the Periodic Electoral Reviews by the Local Government Commission for England. The new wards for two districts (Craven and Harrogate) came into effect at the local government elections on 2 May 2002. In the other districts - Hambleton, Richmondshire, Ryedale, Scarborough and Selby, and the City of York - the new wards will come into effect in May 2003.
4. The Commission noted that five of the new wards in City of York are divided between existing constituencies, as well as five in Harrogate Borough. The Commission do not divide district wards between constituencies and their proposals will realign the constituency boundaries with the new ward boundaries to place wards wholly within seats.

5. The disparity between the electorates of the existing eight constituencies is 15,501. The Commission have recommended changes to seven of the eight seats to reduce this disparity and to respect the boundary between the County of North Yorkshire and the City of York.

## **NORTH YORKSHIRE**

6. The Commission propose to transfer the Harrogate Borough wards of Marston Moor, Ouseburn, and Ribston from the Vale of York seat to the Selby seat, and to include the whole of the Harrogate Borough ward of Spofforth with Lower Wharfedale, which is currently divided between the Skipton and Ripon and Vale of York seats, in the Selby seat. The Selby seat would no longer contain any City of York wards.

7. The Commission propose to increase the electorate of the current Harrogate and Knaresborough seat by including the whole of the Harrogate Borough ward of Saltergate, which is currently divided between the Harrogate and Knaresborough seat and the Skipton and Ripon seat. They also propose to include the Harrogate Borough wards of Claro from the Vale of York seat, and Killinghall from the Skipton and Ripon seat. As a result of including the two rural wards in the Harrogate and Knaresborough seat, the Commission propose that it be designated as a county constituency.

8. The Commission propose to include the whole of the Harrogate Borough wards of Newby and Wathvale, both currently divided between the Skipton and Ripon seat and the Vale of York seat, in the Skipton and Ripon seat. They also propose to transfer the Harrogate Borough ward of Boroughbridge from the Vale of York seat to the Skipton and Ripon seat.

9. The Commission propose to increase the electorate of the Richmond (Yorks) seat by transferring the Hambleton District wards of Bedale, Crakehall, Leeming, and Tanfield from the Vale of York seat. They also propose to include the Hambleton District wards of Easingwold, Helperby, Huby with Sutton, Shipton, Sowerby, Stillington, Thirsk, Thorntons, Tollerton, Topcliffe, White Horse, and Whitestonecliffe from the Vale of York seat to the Ryedale seat. The Ryedale seat would no longer contain any City of York wards.

10. The effect of the changes outlined in the preceding four paragraphs is that the new wards, that are either partly or wholly contained within the existing Vale of York seat, will be distributed between the Harrogate and Knaresborough, Richmond (Yorks), Ryedale, Selby, Skipton and Ripon seats, as well as the York Outer seat (see below). In part, these changes have been necessitated by the creation of the expanded City of York authority, the Commission's decision not to create constituencies that cross the boundary between the County of North Yorkshire and the City of York, and the need to reduce the disparity between the electorates of the seats within North Yorkshire.

11. The Commission propose no change to the Scarborough and Whitby seat. The disparity in the electorates of the six proposed seats is reduced to 8,863 and all six seats have electorates within 5,415 of the county average.

12. The proposed new constituencies are illustrated in outline on the sketch map which forms part of this document (please note the copyright warning below concerning the map). The letters on

the map refer to the districts and the numbers refer to the district wards. The map is to be used in conjunction with the ward listing at the end of this document which shows the letters and districts, the numbers and wards, and the 2000 ward electorates on which the Commission are required by law to work.

13. The composition of the six constituencies provisionally recommended would be (the 2000 electorates are shown in brackets):-

**HARROGATE AND KNARESBOROUGH COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (71,742).** Eighteen wards of the Borough of **Harrogate**:- Bilton, Claro, Granby, Harlow Moor, High Harrogate, Hookstone, Killinghall, Knaresborough East, Knaresborough King James, Knaresborough Scriven Park, Low Harrogate, New Park, Pannal, Rosett, Saltergate, Starbeck, Stray, Woodfield.

**RICHMOND (YORKS) COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (74,434).** Eighteen wards of the District of **Hambleton**:- Bedale, Brompton, Broughton and Greenhow, Cowtons, Crakehall, Great Ayton, Leeming, Leeming Bar, Morton on Swale, Northallerton Broomfield, Northallerton Central, Northallerton North, Osmotherley, Romanby, Rudby, Stokesley, Swainby, Tanfield; and the District of **Richmondshire**.

**RYEDALE COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (73,534).** Twelve wards of the District of **Hambleton**:- Easingwold, Helperby, Huby with Sutton, Shipton, Sowerby, Stillington, Thirsk, Thorntons, Tollerton, Topcliffe, White Horse, Whitestonecliffe; the District of **Ryedale**; and two wards of the Borough of **Scarborough**:- Filey, Hertford.

**SCARBOROUGH AND WHITBY COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (76,572).** Twenty-three wards of the Borough of **Scarborough**:- Castle, Cayton, Central, Danby, Derwent Valley, Eastfield, Esk Valley, Falsgrave Park, Fylingdales, Lindhead, Mayfield, Mulgrave, Newby, North Bay, Northstead, Ramshill, Scalby, Hackness and Staintondale, Seamer, Stepney, Streonshalh, Weaponness, Whitby West Cliff, Woodlands.

**SELBY COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (67,709).** Four wards of the Borough of **Harrogate**:- Marston Moor, Ouseburn, Ribston, Spofforth and Lower Wharfedale; and the District of **Selby**.

**SKIPTON AND RIPON COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (74,752).** The District of **Craven**, and thirteen wards of the Borough of **Harrogate**:- Bishop Monkton, Boroughbridge, Kirkby Malzeard, Lower Nidderdale, Mashamshire, Newby, Nidd Valley, Pateley Bridge, Ripon Minster, Ripon Moorside, Ripon Spa, Washburn, Wathvale.

14. Please note that the wards have not been shown for those boroughs and districts (e.g. Richmondshire District) where the whole of the borough or district is contained within a proposed constituency. However, as already mentioned, a full ward listing with 2000 electorates is given at the end of this document.

## **CITY OF YORK**

15. Having decided that the City of York should be treated separately and allocated two whole seats, rather than one whole seat and parts of three others as at present, the Commission considered whether they should divide the City into two halves, or keep as much as possible of the urban core of York in one seat and include the rural area in another. They considered dividing York along the course of the River Ouse, but noted that there were not enough electors on the western side of York to form a constituency. They looked at alternative divisions of York into two halves, but decided that to do this would cause too much disruption to the electors in the existing City of York seat. They, therefore, decided to provisionally recommend an urban core constituency, with the rural area forming a constituency around it.

16. The Commission noted that the size of the existing City of York seat had to be reduced. They also noted that after ward boundary changes, the electorate had reduced from 81,244 to 79,936, which they considered still to be too large. They therefore propose to transfer the City of York ward of Hull Road from the urban York seat to the rural York seat. The other twelve City of York wards will form the rural York seat.

17. The Commission have provisionally decided to rename the urban seat as York Central BC and to name the rural seat as York Outer CC. They considered alternative names for both seats, but the absence of any significant settlement or geographical feature in the area of the new unitary authority outside the City of York itself, made it difficult to propose a more readily identifiable name for the rural seat.

18. The composition of the two constituencies provisionally recommended would be (the 2000 electorates are shown in brackets):-

**YORK CENTRAL BOROUGH CONSTITUENCY (73,439).** Nine wards of the **City of York**:- Acomb, Clifton, Dringhouses and Woodthorpe, Fishergate, Guildhall, Heworth, Holgate, Micklegate, Westfield.

**YORK OUTER COUNTY CONSTITUENCY (69,334).** Thirteen wards of **City of York**:- Bishopthorpe, Derwent, Fulford, Haxby and Wigginton, Heslington, Heworth Without, Hull Road, Huntington and New Earswick, Osbaldwick, Rural West York, Skelton, Rawcliffe and Clifton Without, Strensall, Wheldrake.

19. Please also note that the wards named in this document are the new wards that were created by the following Orders which came into effect at the local elections on 2 May 2002:-

The District of Craven (Electoral Changes) Order 2000;  
The Borough of Harrogate (Electoral Changes) (No.2) Order 2000;

and which will come into effect at the local elections in May 2003:-

The District of Hambleton (Electoral Changes) Order 2000;  
The District of Richmondshire (Electoral Changes) Order 2000;  
The District of Ryedale (Electoral Changes) Order 2000;  
The Borough of Scarborough (Electoral Changes) Order 2000;  
The District of Selby (Electoral Changes) Order 2000;

### **Publication of Provisional Recommendations**

20. The provisional recommendations will be published formally in a notice appearing in local newspapers in North Yorkshire and York on 23 May 2002. Local authorities, MPs, the Political Parties' Headquarters, and others will be sent a copy of the recommendations. The notice will also be published on the Commission's web site at:-

**Representation Period: 23 May 2002 to 30 June 2002**

22. The Commission are statutorily required to consider representations about their provisional recommendations made within one month of local publication on 23 May 2002. However, the normal one month representation period has been extended to 30 June 2002 to allow for the Queen's Golden Jubilee holiday.

23. Representations should be addressed to the Boundary Commission for England, PO Box 31060, London, SW1V 2FF, or faxed to 020 7533 5176, or emailed to gerald.tessier@ons.gov.uk. All representations received by the Commission will be acknowledged.

24. Please note that the Commission are not statutorily required to consider any representations made after 30 June 2002, but will endeavour to take late representations into account. However, the later the representation is made, the more difficult this will be. The Commission therefore ask that all representations be made within the one month period. In the event that a local inquiry is held into the provisional recommendations, all representations will be made public beforehand so that interested persons may prepare for the local inquiry. Any representation received too late to be issued with the other representations before the local inquiry cannot be given the same weight as the other representations because other interested persons will not have had the same opportunity to consider it.

25. Where representations objecting to the provisional recommendations are made by an interested local authority (a county or district council) or by a body of 100 or more electors, the Commission cannot proceed with their final recommendations to the Secretary of State until a local inquiry has been held. If the Commission decide to alter their recommendations as a result of the inquiry, the revised recommendations must also be published and representations invited, but a further local inquiry is not obligatory.

26. Those who make representations are requested to say whether they approve of, or object to, the Commission's proposals and to give their reasons for their approval or objection. In particular, objectors are advised to say what they propose in place of the Commission's recommendations and should note that an objection accompanied by a counter-proposal is likely to carry more weight than a simple statement of objection.

27. The Commission wish to stress that their provisional recommendations relate solely to parliamentary constituencies and do not affect county, district or parish boundaries, taxes or services. The Commission will therefore not take account of any representation made about those local issues.

### **Background Note**

28. The Commission are constituted under Schedule 1 to the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986. The ex officio Chairman is the Speaker of the House of Commons. The Deputy Chairman, who presides over Commission meetings, is a High Court Judge appointed by the Lord Chancellor. The other two Commissioners are appointed by the Secretary of State for Transport, Local Government and the Regions. The two Assessors to the Commission are the Registrar General of

England and Wales and the Director General of Ordnance Survey. Assistant Commissioners are lawyers appointed by the Secretary of State to conduct local inquiries.

29. The Commission are required by the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986 as amended by the Boundary Commissions Act 1992 to conduct a general review of all the constituencies in England every eight to twelve years. The Commission completed their previous general review on 12 April 1995 and must therefore complete the current review after 11 April 2003 and before 12 April 2007.

30. The general review started formally with the publication of a notice in the London Gazette on 17 February 2000. The Commission's recommendations throughout the review must by law be based on the numbers of electors on the electoral registers on that date.

## **Rules**

31. In recommending new constituencies, the Commission are required to give effect to the Rules for Redistribution of Seats which are contained in Schedule 2 to the 1986 Act.

32. Rule 1 places a limit on the total number of constituencies. Rule 2 requires single member constituencies. Rule 3 relates to the City of London. Rule 4 states that county and London borough boundaries are to be followed so far as is practicable. Rule 5 states that the electorates of constituencies are to be as nearly equal as practicable. Rule 6 allows the Commission to depart from rules 4 and 5 if special geographical considerations make a departure desirable. Rule 7 allows the Commission to depart from other rules; and requires them to take account of inconveniences caused or local ties broken by changes to constituencies. Rule 8 defines the electoral quota as the total number of parliamentary electors in England (36,995,157) divided by the existing number of seats (529), and requires the Commission to use the electorates as at the start of a review.

## **Procedures**

33. In conducting a general review of constituencies, the Commission are required by the legislation to follow certain procedures, principally to provide for public consultation.

34. The Secretary of State must be given notice of a review and that notice must be published in the London Gazette. Provisional recommendations must be published in newspapers in the affected constituencies and, unless the proposals are for no changes to be made, they must also be deposited for public inspection in at least one place in each affected constituency.

35. Representations may be made within one month of publication of the provisional recommendations and the Commission must take any representations into consideration. Where objections are received from a county or district council or a body of 100 or more electors, a local inquiry must be held.

36. If the Commission revise their recommendations as a result of an inquiry, the revised recommendations must also be published and further representations invited and considered. A second local inquiry cannot be forced by these further representations, but there is discretionary

power to hold a second inquiry. Any further modifications, as a result of further representations or a second inquiry, must also be published and representations invited. When the Commission have decided their final recommendations for the whole country, they must submit a report to the Secretary of State.

### **Implementation of the recommendations**

37. The Secretary of State has a statutory duty to lay the Commission's report before Parliament together with a draft Order in Council giving effect to the Commission's recommendations with or without modifications. If modifications are proposed, the Secretary of State must also lay a statement of reasons for the modifications.

38. The draft Order in Council is submitted to both Houses of Parliament for approval and, after it is made by Her Majesty in Council, it cannot be called into question in any legal proceedings. The new constituencies take effect at the next following general election.

39. The above information is intended to be a general guide only. For a definitive statement of the law, please refer to the Parliamentary Constituencies Act 1986 – as amended by the Boundary Commissions Act 1992, the Local Government (Wales) Act 1994, the Government of Wales Act 1998, and the Scotland Act 1998 – together with the Court of Appeal ruling in R v Boundary Commission for England Ex parte Foot [1983] QB 600.
