How you get paid

All Naval personnel are required to have a bank account. Your salary will be paid directly into your bank account at the end of each month and a pay slip issued to show details of your earnings and the deductions made for tax, National Insurance and other charges. In order to ensure that your first month's salary can be paid promptly, you are strongly advised to open a bank account prior to joining the Royal Navy or Royal Marines. In the event that this is not possible, guidance will be given to those who need to open an appropriate account after joining the Service.

Additional forms of pay

Some types of work attract additional pay on top of the annual basic pay. The figures here are for guidance only.

Submarine pay: Awarded to all qualifying Submariners. The initial rate is £11.88 up to a maximum of £20.80 per day. In addition, a £5,000 'golden hello' is awarded on completion of training plus an extra £5 a day at sea.

Aircrew pay: Ranges from £7.14 on qualifying up to a maximum of £19.59 per day.

Other: Additional forms of pay are awarded to Divers, Hydrographers, Nurses and for a few other very specialist activities.

Longer separation allowance:

Once you have completed basic training, you will be eligible for a bonus of £6.56 per day, rising to £27.69 per day when serving away from your family or base unit.

Retention bonuses: Several bonuses are available to various branches and specialisations for service over a certain period. For more details speak to your Careers Advisor.

Additional forms of pay

Some types of work attract additional pay on top of the annual basic pay. The figures here are for guidance only.

Submarine pay: Awarded to all qualifying Submariners. The initial rate is £11.88 up to a maximum of £26.14 per day. In addition, a £5,000 'golden hello' is awarded on completion of training plus an extra £5 a day at sea.

Flying pay: Awarded to Pilots and Observers on completion of professional training. Ranges from £13.66 on qualifying up to a maximum of £36.84 per day.

Other: Additional forms of pay are awarded to Divers, Hydrographers, Nurses and for a few other very specialist activities.

Once you have completed basic training, you will be eligible for a bonus of £6.56 per day, rising to £27.69 per day when serving away from your family or base unit.
