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around my house to check for damage, and there wasn't any. At this point the uniform sergeant told me I was under arrest for some section or another. I was then taken in an ordinary car to Castlereagh police station. I can't remember what time we arrived but it was still early morning. At the police station, in the cell area, a uniform officer took my details and then I was taken to see a doctor. The doctor examined me and asked if I had been mistreated. I told him I had been treated well and had no complaints. After I'd seen the doctor a uniform officer took me to a cell. At this point I should add that whenever I was being moved about in the cell area and in between interview rooms I was only dealt with by uniform officers. In relation to the uniform officers with whom I had dealings during this time, I have no complaint to make about their conduct at all. After I had only been in the cell for about 10 minutes I was taken to an interview room. This room was box shaped, about the size of a cell and had no windows. There was a table longways against a wall with two chairs on one side and one on the other. High on the walls, close to the corners, were two cameras behind black perspex. When I entered the room I could see that 2 plain clothes officers were already in there. One of them was seated. I would describe him as about 50 years old, about 5'10", medium or average build and had a bit of a beard. On the first interview he seemed to do the writing. The other was stood. He was about 33 years old, broader with short gelled hair and about 5'10" tall. At this point I ought to make it clear that during my detention I was only interviewed by a total of 4 plain clothes officers who worked in two alternating pairs. The two officers who I
