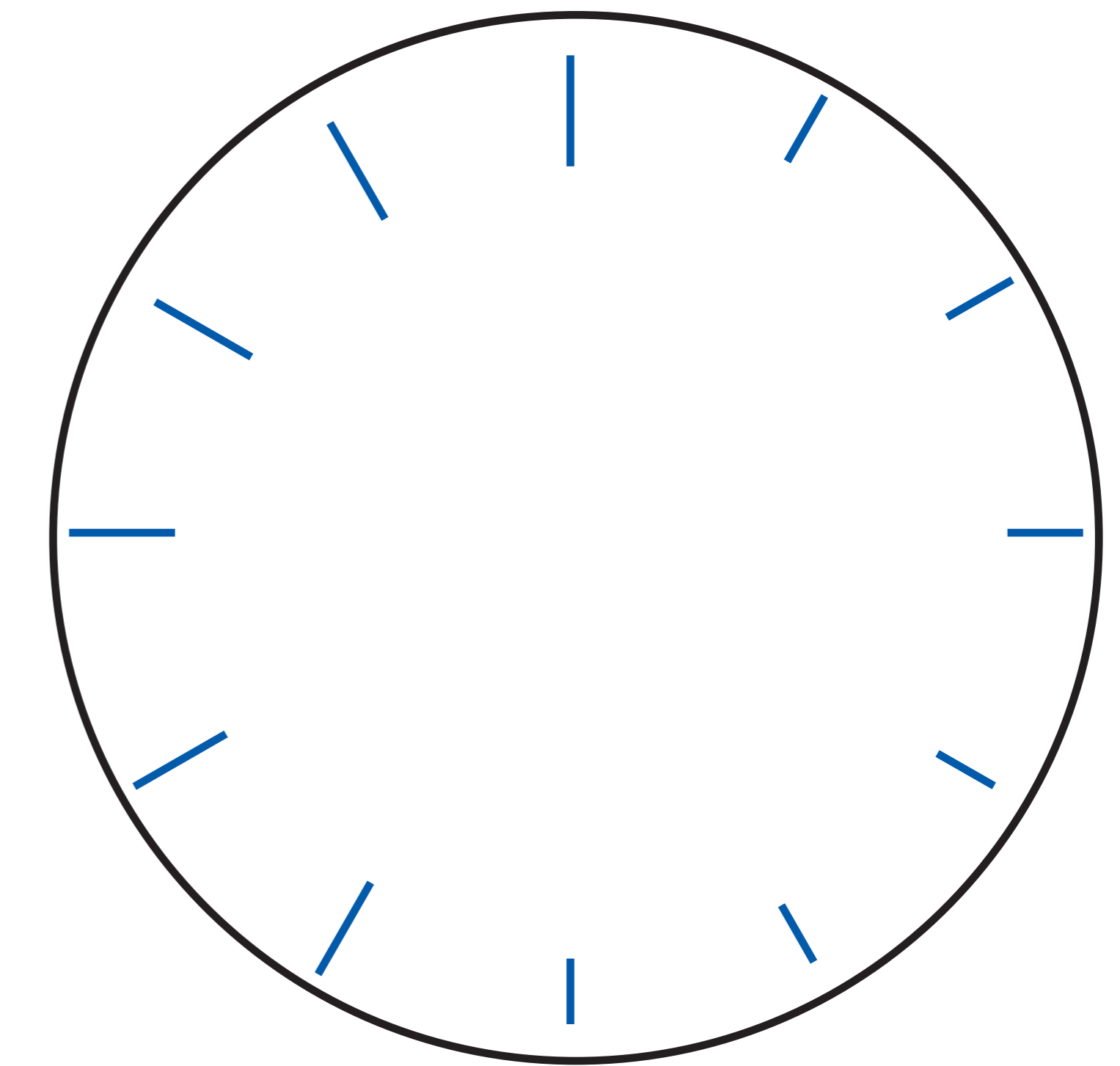


Welcome to St Peter's Square

The houses in St Peter's Square were built during the 1830s on land owned by George Scott of Ravenscourt Park, and an open space was left in the centre for use as a garden by the residents. It is thought that J C Loudon was at least influential in the garden design, if not directly responsible for it.

The rectangular garden had originally included a well and an engine house in the centre to raise water from a deep artesian well and pump to the neighbouring residents.

In 1912 plans to build on the square were submitted to the borough council. The St Peter's Square Committee intervened and purchased the land for £7,650 in order to save the garden. Sir William Bull, the local Member of Parliament also contributed to the purchase and the land was transferred to the council in December 1913. The open space was laid out by the Metropolitan Gardens' Association and formally opened to the public on 29 April 1915.

The Greek Runner, a bronze statue by Sir William Blake Richmond, who lived at Beavor Lodge nearby, stands at the centre of St Peter's Square. The statue was presented to Hammersmith Borough Council by the family of the sculptor and erected as a memorial to him in July 1926.

The square is listed in the English Heritage Register of Parks and Gardens of Special Historic Interest in England as a Grade II garden.

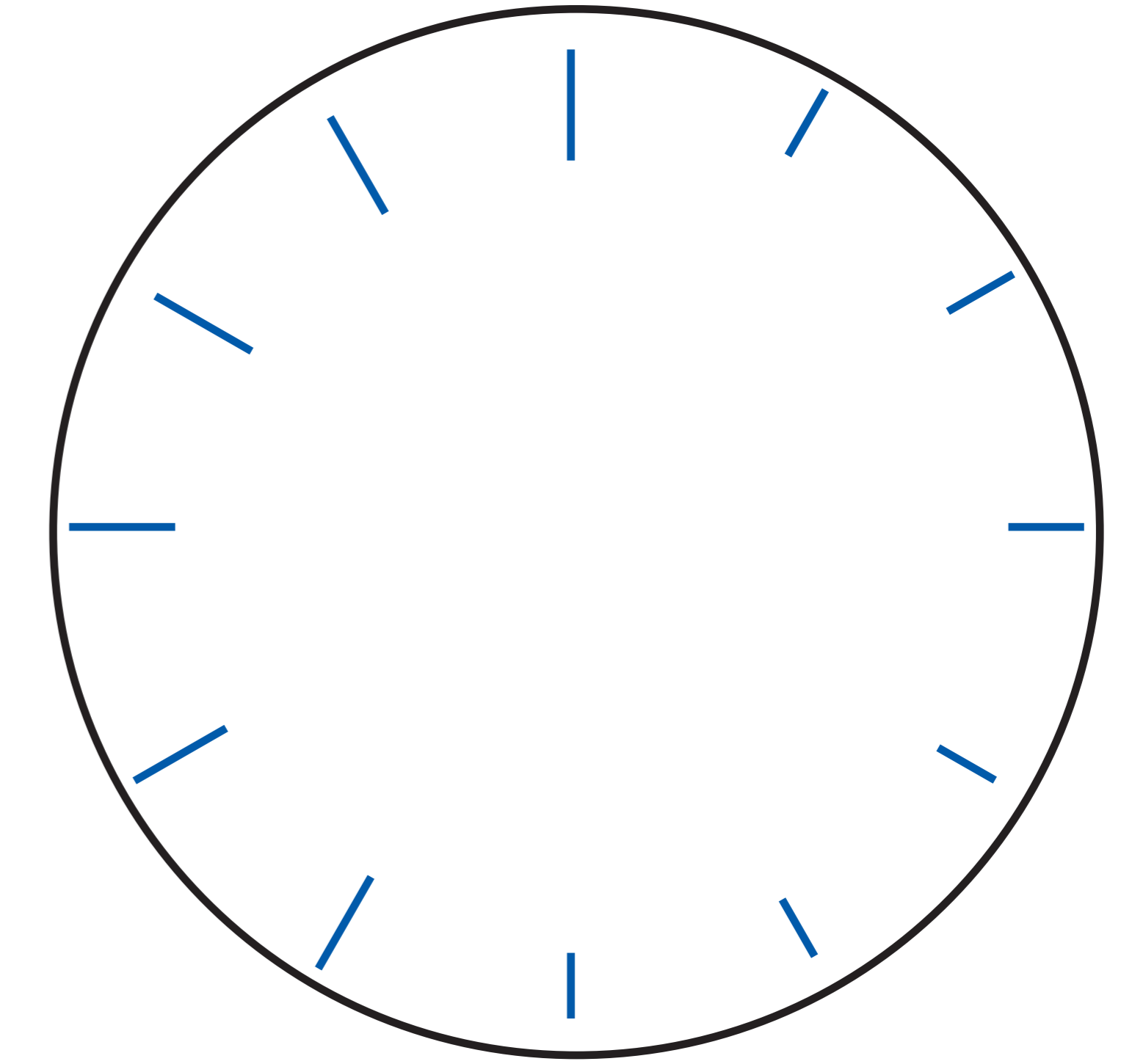

Welcome to Margravine Gardens



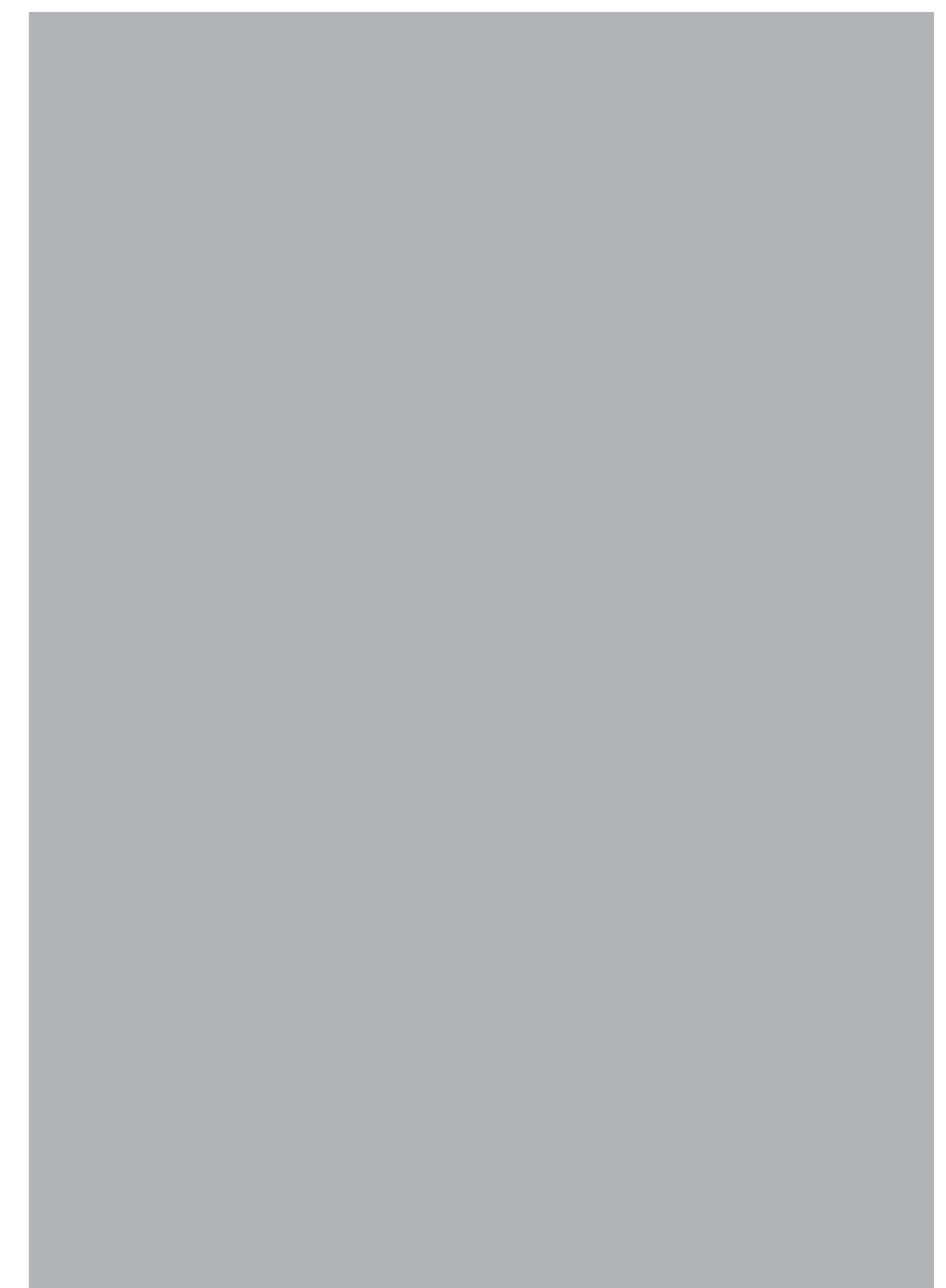

The name Margravine refers to the title of 19th Century widow of the Margrave of Brandenburg-Ansbach (died 1806). They had a home at Brandenburg House which was next to Charing Cross Hospital.

The Margravine died in 1828 and is commemorated by a number of roads in the area such as Margravine Road and Margravine Gardens. A Margrave is equivalent rank in the British peerage to a Marquess.

Welcome to Rowberry Mead



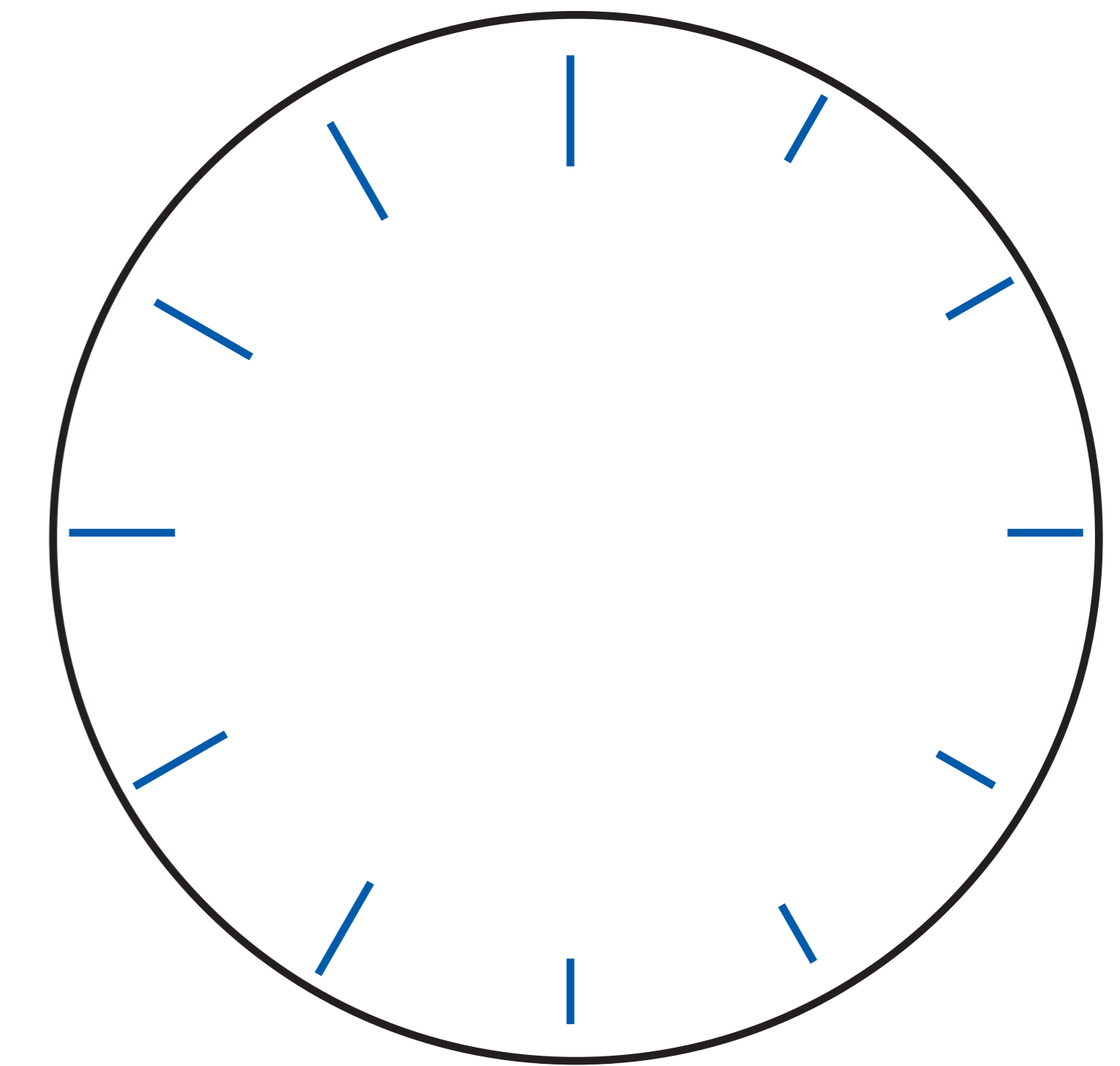

Formally known as Roseberry Meade, this was an old homestead dated from 1638, which used to be attached to a cherry orchard, "reputed to be the finest in England".

In 1661, the Bishop of London granted a lease "of all that Meade called Rowberry Meade with appurtenances, containing (by estimation) six acres".

In the late 19th century osiers and reeds were grown and dried at Rowberry Meade for the basketmaking industry.

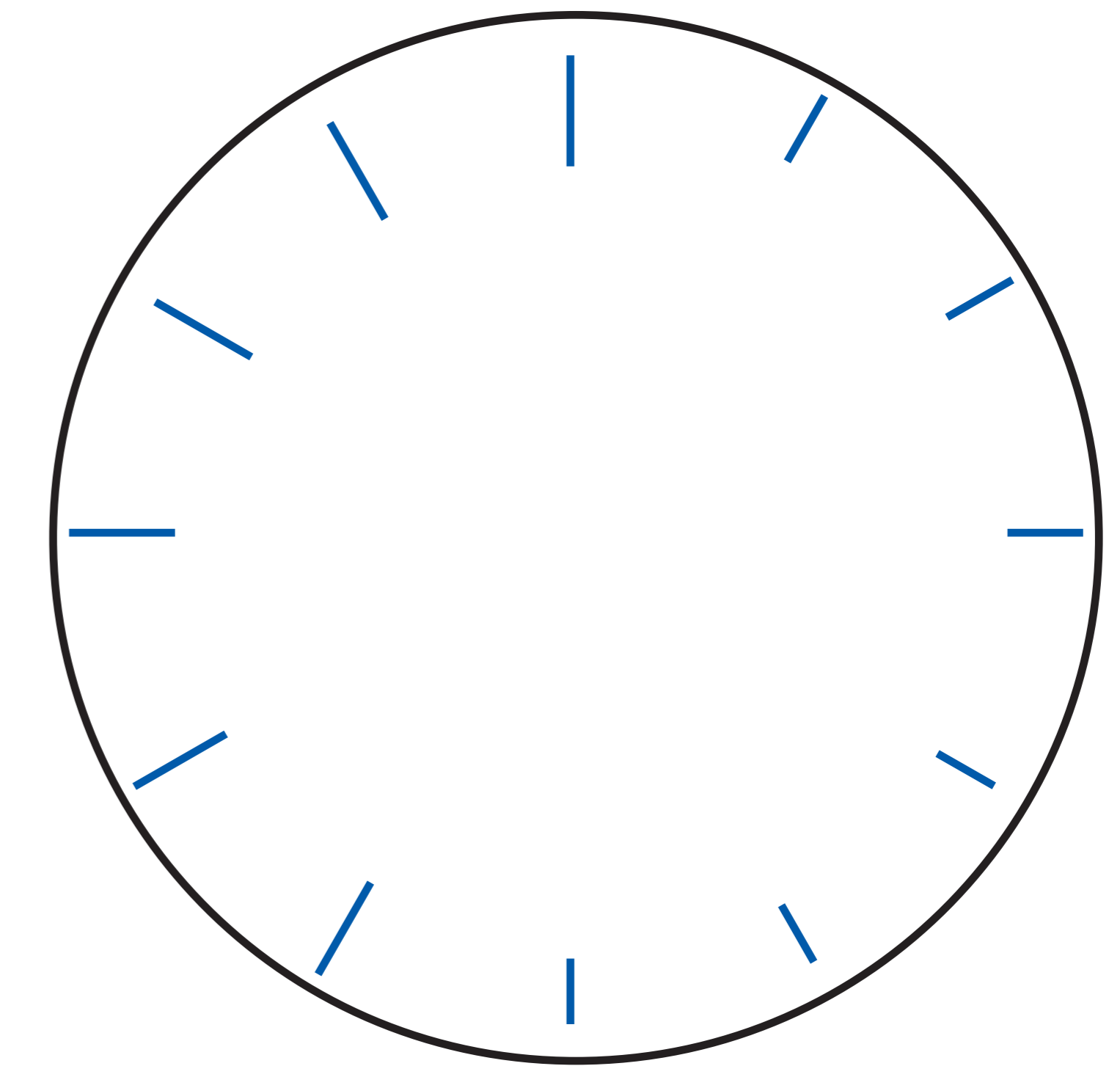

Welcome to Gwendwr Gardens

Before the Second World War, the site of Gwendwr Gardens had been the Cedars Lawn tennis club. In 1948 the freeholders of the land, the Gunter Estate, offered the site to Fulham Borough Council on the understanding that it was to be laid out as a memorial pleasure ground for the benefit of local residents.

Mr. R.G. Gunter contributed towards the cost of laying out the land as a commemoration of the extensive damage that the area had suffered during the war, particularly on the night of 20 February 1944.

The gardens were opened to the public on 23 July 1949.

A statue by H. Cawthra entitled 'Meditation' and a plaque commemorating the opening of the gardens did stand on the west side.
